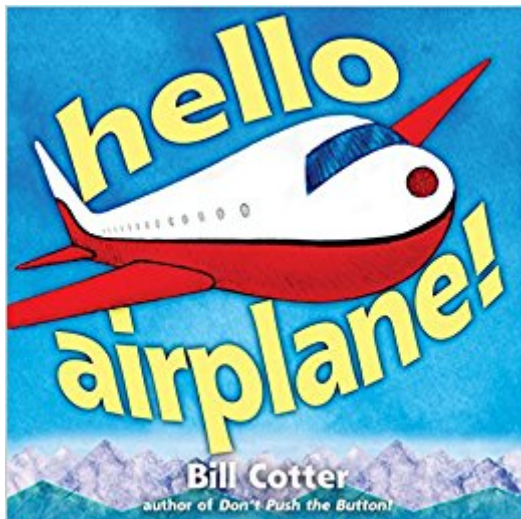

Bill Cotter's Hello, Airplane! is a perfect book to introduce your little one to air travel! From boarding the airplane (on the old-fashioned portable stairs--do they still use those?), to leaving the ground, flying over people, mountains, trees, and birds, and saying hello to the ground again, the airplane journeys through the night. Cotter's drawings are simple and warm, and will encourage safe, happy, friendly feelings about air travel. I enjoyed his use of perspective. Some drawings are from below, looking up, others from above, looking down, some as if looking out of the plane, some as if watching the plane from the ground. The text is sparse, as you would expect, for the pre-reading and very early reading audience. This would be a cute book to take along for a toddler's first airplane journey. I bought this along with other books by Bill Cotter. While not as inventive as his "Don't Push the Button" books and "Beard in a Box," it is a nice, early introduction to reading for even the youngest of readers. Beautifully illustrated in a sort of crayon picture book, it talks about a persons first flight and may be helpful for kids getting on planes for the first time. My son (2 years old) enjoys it, but he doesn't ask for it constantly like other books by the author. Still worth a look especially if your child enjoys simple stories or is starting to learn to read.

This book would be a perfect companion to a small child on her first airplane flight or even before, to prepare her for that exciting ride of her life high up in the sky. This book documents an airplane's journey from the time of liftoff to the time of touch down. It exhibits wonderful vocabulary words such as hello (airplane), over (trees, mountains and people), through (clouds) and above (birds) just to name a few. The book has a very happy and uplifting vibe and the illustrations are colourful, big and engaging, just a perfect match for the sparse text. Both are so kid- friendly and appealing to that specific age group. I highly recommend this book.

Graphic and children's reviews on the blog typically feature two or three images from the book's interior, which are not reproduced here. Note that I don't really do stars. To me a book is either worth reading or it isn't. I can't rate it three-fifths worth reading! The only reason I've relented and started putting stars up there is to credit the good ones, which were being unfairly uncredited. So, all you'll ever see from me is a five-star or a one-star (since no stars isn't a rating, unfortunately). I rated this book WORTHY!! I envy writers who can illustrate. This author does a great job of conveying to young children in simple words and more complex images, the thrill of an airplane flight. It's an ideal introduction to children who are going to be traveling by air, or to any child who dreams of flying. The story is very short and has few words, so there's not a whole heck of a lot to say about it, but the drawings are warm and engrossing, and will catch a child's eye and hold it. They show perspectives that perhaps your child hasn't seen or noted, or thought about yet, and give a really good idea about what it's like to fly - about what it's like to climb higher than a chair or the upper floor of your home, or even the top of a tall building - higher even than the birds! We not only look up through the trees (which is a image that will make a good and familiar impression), but also down, and in some interesting ways - such as looking down at the airplane's shadow on a cloud, which is an enthralling image. These pictures are colorful in some instances and rather muted in others, showing a changing view of things, just as you would experience during an airplane flight. Finally, at the end of the flight, the people get to climb down back to the good earth, say goodbye to the airplane and head off on their various journeys. I still remember my first airplane flight and this was a fun reminder of how new and different, and exciting it all was.
